Adventure challenge

Camp Summit continues to offer the Adventure Challenge program to campers who wish to take advantage of this longer and more adventurous camp experience. This program facilitates experiences where campers become even more immersed in the camp life. This allows them opportunities to participate in activities like overnight hiking trips and a 'choose your own adventure day' that are available only to the Adventure Challenge Session. The 'choose your own adventure day' has campers venturing off-site, choosing from white water rafting, Whistler site-seeing, Zip-Trek adventures in Whistler and, Sea Kayaking around

Bowen Island! Our overnight hiking trips are the highlight of the Adventure Challenge Session. These trips go from 2 – 4 nights and take our campers to some of Canada's most spectacular Provincial Parks such as Garibaldi, Elfin Lakes, Cheakamus Lakes and the Marriot Basin in Pemberton. Learning to live in the backcountry with 'leave no trace camping' principles and surrounding oneself with spectacular mountain views are only some of the reasons why the 2 week Adventure Challenge Session continues to be our

We've already had our first snowfall of the season, but it has melted away...more will come...and more, and more.....All the more reason to look back and remember warmer times.

Outdoor Education at Camp Summit is not only a door to the outdoors for students but a tool for their success. More and more research is proving just how vital the outdoors is for the well-being of today's children. Cornell University environmental psychologists reported in 2003 that a room with a view of nature can help protect children against stress and that nature in or around the home appears to be a significant factor in protecting the psychological well-being of children in rural areas. One reason for the emotional benefits of nature may be that green space fosters social interaction and thereby promotes social support. Nature also offers nurturing solitude - a study of Finnish teenagers showed that they often went into natural settings after upsetting events; there, they could clear their minds and gain perspective and relax.

Through the outdoor education program at Summit, more and more children are exposed to the benefits of interacting with our natural environment. We would like to take this opportunity to THANK the schools and teachers for continuing to believe in Camp Summit. Every year the bond strengthens and we value the friendships we have made along the way.

Through my 22 years in camping, I have had the opportunity to see the transformative and positive impact camp has on the children who attend. Four years ago, along with the founding board members, we began the journey to create a school where that type of impact can occur throughout the entire year. CMA was born and is now thriving as a school that endeavours to graduate inspired leaders with the exceptional academic, social, and emotional preparedness common to conscientious and successful global citizens.

While Camp Summit was in full swing this past summer, we were also busy building a new campus for CMA! We are now almost half way through our second year at Coast Mountain Academy. Building a fully functioning school, from the groundbreaking ceremony in late June to our opening day in early September, was truly an amazing feat and it was encouraging to have so many people working as a team to get this goal accomplished. Our enrolment has quadrupled since last year and we are on track to reach one hundred students this year. It has been an exciting 18 months of school development since we opened in September 2013.

Coast Mountain Academy is a university-preparatory school for students in grades 7 through 12. Our unique 21st-century approach fosters opportunities for well-rounded and engaged learning. CMA offers a dynamic experience that nurtures students' sense of wonder and promotes the pursuit of life-long learning.

CMA offers a unique learning opportunity to integrate real life experiences with academics. Every Friday afternoon, our students participate in an OE3 (Outdoor, Experiential, and Ecological Education) activity. OE3 activities aim to engage students in a practical, hands-on experience that compliments their theory-based instruction. For the remainder of the school year, we will continue to provide at least two outbound OE3 activities per month. Snowshoeing to Red Heather Hut in Garibaldi Park coupled with learning winter survival techniques is one of the many activities occurring between now and the end of the year. And of course, our L.E.A.D (Learning Expeditions For Academic Discovery) trips in June are being planned now with Bowron Lakes, the West Coast trail, Kettle Valley and the Sayward Canoe route as possible destinations.
